

WOMEN IN THE INFORMAL SECTOR

Even though the importance of women workers to informal economic activities is well recognized, many studies have yet to disaggregate data by gender. Existing information does, however, point to the increasing "feminization" of the informal sector--to the fact that in many regions women are becoming the principal source of labour for activities outside the formal economy. And since those income-generating activities make a significant contribution to economic growth, it is crucial that they be supported by development plans and policies.

Improve the collection and utilization of gender-disaggregated data and develop more appropriate methodologies for such collection.

Provide women with support services through innovative means, for example

- training, education and extension services
- credit facilities
- marketing assistance

IMPLEMENTATION

- social security
- other social services such as day-care centres, communal kitchens, etc.

MONITORING AND EVALUATION

Assess, on an ongoing basis, the impact of policies on women in order to identify the need for possible changes.
