Global Care Chains Virtual Discussion

In June UN-INSTRAW is hosting a virtual discussion about Global Care Chains in English and Spanish. Global care chains are created as a result of the so-called "care crisis" generated by the inadequate public response to the increasing number of women in developed countries entering the labour market. These women create a strong demand for domestic and care-giving labour - which is in large part met by migrant women from developing countries. In turn, these migrant women shift their own domestic and care responsibilities onto others in the country of origin - usually a female relative or hired worker. This shifting of reproductive labour from one person to another creates "global care chains" along gender, socio-economic and ethnic lines. The discussion will look at global care chains and their effect on migrant populations and on development.

Skilled Female Labour Migration Policy Brief prepared by Eleonore Kofman and Parvati Rughuram for FocusMigration

This policy brief addresses why skilled female migration has thus far been ignored by most literature on the subject, which most often analyzes women's employment in sex work or domestic work. It shows that women form an important part of skilled migratory streams and looks at factors that influence female skilled migration. The brief concludes with suggestions for further research and for policy intervention.



<u>Promoting the Rights of Women Migrant Domestic Workers Issue Brief</u> ILO

This Issue Brief is part of a series that examines women's labour force participation in Arab States using a gender equality and workers' rights perspective. It looks at the increasing employment of women migrant domestic workers to fill the unmet needs in provision of social care services and examines women migrant domestic workers' lack of legal protection and resultant vulnerabilities. Based on work in Lebanon, it outlines lessons learned that can be applied throughout the region on mobilizing concerned actors and raising awareness for policy change and enforceable standards to protect women migrant domestic workers' rights.
